Michael Hanrahan has been a key member of Clarke Caton Hintz for over thirteen years. Currently, Michael is the project manager for the 164th Street Garage, a new 660 space garage supporting the new Yankee Stadium; and the "Big 4" projects at Brookdale Community College, which include the renovation of the Robert J. Collins Arena, construction of the new Recreation and Education Center, the renovation and expansion of the Automotive Technologies facility and the interior renovation of the Western Monmouth Branch Campus.

In addition to distinguishing himself professionally, Michael Hanrahan has also volunteered his time to serve the profession of architecture. In 1999, Michael began his tenure on the Executive Committee of AIA Central New Jersey, where he held a variety of positions culminating in his Presidency in 2005.
